ABOUT THE AREA

Morton, Illinois is part of the Peoria metropolitan area. It is best known as the "Pumpkin Capital of the World" because the Nestlé/Libby's plant in town processes over 80% of the world's canned pumpkin. Morton hosts the annual Pumpkin Festival, a major community event in September featuring a parade, pumpkin-themed foods, and carnival rides. Beyond pumpkins, Morton has a strong agricultural and manufacturing presence. It's home to companies like Caterpillar Inc. and has a reputation for being a well-maintained, family-friendly town with excellent schools, parks, and a strong sense of community.

Situated in the heart of the Illinois River Valley, Morton offers the best in Illinois living. With lower housing and commodities costs, plus a higher standard of living than other communities its size, Morton is one of the best living values in the nation. Morton is located in Tazewell County and has a population of 17,000. In 2013 Morton was chosen as "One of the Top 10 Places to Raise a Family" by Family Circle Magazine.

The median age is 40 years, and there are a large percentage of family households. With a property tax rate of 6.8207 percent and no public debt, Morton puts its resources where they will best benefit its citizens. The result is quality living in a safe and well-run community.

Peoria, a bustling city on the Illinois River, is the state's oldest settlement, having been founded in the late 1600s by the French. Formerly a river port and center of industrial commerce, it is now a vibrant yet reasonably priced metropolis with all the historic landmarks and architecture befitting a city of its age. It also has a thriving arts scene, with venues like the Renaissance Park and Civic Center drawing visitors from all over the country. It is a diverse, inclusive and welcoming area. With strong Black, Hispanic and Asian-Indian communities, plus one of the nation's largest Lebanese American populations, Peoria ranks No. 82 on the "2023 Most Diverse Cities in America" list (Niche.com).

A cost of living index of 76.3

Peoria has a 27% lower cost of living than the national average, despite its metropolitan layout and prime location on the Illinois River. The city has a median home price of \$104,801. You can save money on food and utilities by relocating to Peoria while paying slightly more for transportation. The average monthly apartment rent in Peoria is only \$816, so living here is relatively cheap.

Natural Beauty

The Wildlife Prairie State Park in Illinois is home to over 50 different species of native animals. Over 150 animals call the zoo's 2,000 acres home, and visitors can also go fishing, ride a train, and camp out there for the night.

The Peoria Zoo, Luthy Botanical Garden, and five public golf courses are just a few of the attractions that can be found within the city's extensive park system. The Peoria Park District is the largest in Illinois and the first of its kind in the city. The Peoria Park District hosts nearly 9,000 acres of green space and more than 50 miles of hiking and biking trails — with miles upon miles of additional trails throughout the region (peoriaparks.org). The Peoria area also boasts the largest concentration of certified organic farms in Illinois (Greater Peoria Economic Development Council).

Academia

A university community has long thrived in this city. The area is home to a number of prestigious universities, including Bradley University, Midstate College, Methodist College, OSF St. Francis College of Nursing, the University of Illinois College of Medicine, Illinois Central College, and Robert Morris University.

Moreover, Illinois Central University's main campus can be found in East Peoria, while Eureka College can be found in adjacent Eureka. Bloomington and Champaign, homes to Illinois State University and University of Illinois respectively, are nearby.



As summer winds down and the weather begins to chill, people around the area go a little pumpkin crazy. The Morton Pumpkin Festival is a great event for fans of the ubiquitous squash.

When the pumpkins have been gathered, and the winter has fallen, the East Peoria Festival of Lights becomes a popular destination for locals and visitors alike. One of the largest lit festivals in the country, the Folepi's Winter Wonderland drive-through show runs throughout the month of December, beginning with the Parade of Lights.

Fine Arts

From vaudeville to the present day, the performing arts run deep in Peoria! The Peoria Symphony Orchestra is the nation's 14th oldest symphony orchestra, while Peoria Players Theatre is the oldest continuously running community theater in Illinois and fourth oldest in the nation (peoriasymphony.org; peoriaplayers.org)

Midwest Values and Kindness

According to the list that was created by etiquette expert Marjabelle Young Stewart, Peoria is continuously ranked among the Top 10 Most Well Mannered Cities in the country.

The locals are exceptionally courteous, and they will not think twice about giving you a friendly grin, a wave, or a helping hand if you find yourself in a sticky situation. Greater Peoria's nonprofit sector is spearheaded by one of the top United Ways in the country for per capita giving and includes one of the nation's top Easterseals chapters, with a host of ways to volunteer and make a difference in the community.

Access to the best healthcare

Around a quarter of the city's GDP is contributed by the healthcare sector. The Children's Hospital of Illinois, OSF Saint Francis Medical Center, Carle Health Methodist Hospital and Carle Health Proctor Hospital are the area's three largest medical facilities. Peoria is also home to the University of Illinois College of Medicine and St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital's Midwest facility.
